

TEDDY ROOSEVELT:

AN AMERICAN ICON

Theodore Roosevelt sits atop Mount Rushmore, nestled between Thomas Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln. He was chosen to be a part of this historical structure in 1927 because he was considered among our greatest presidents, a position he retains among historians today. We'll examine T.R.'s life, overcoming debilitating asthma as a child to build a reputation as a robust outdoorsman, astute politician, pioneering conservationist and international statesman. Roosevelt was New York City's police commissioner, assistant secretary of the Navy, volunteer Rough Rider, New York governor and vice president before becoming the youngest president at age 42 following William McKinley's assassination in 1901.

Instructor Bio: Jim Peters, J.D., is director emeritus of the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at KU and author of *Arlington National Cemetery: Shrine to America's Heroes*. He also teaches a course on the Underground Railroad in Northeast Kansas. ■

EVERYONE HAS A STORY TO TELL

LT COL J U RICKS

Our Brewster community is filled with many armed services veterans. This month we proudly lift up Vietnam veteran J Ricks.

Lieutenant Colonel J Ricks is a native of Port Arthur, Texas. After high school graduation, J attended the University of Texas for one year. In 1952 he signed up for the Air Force in their aviation cadet program. He went to Harlingen Air Force Base in Texas for five months to their navigator bombardier school and finished bombardier training in December 1953 in Sacramento, California. He was commissioned as a second lieutenant.

Mather Air Force Base in Sacramento was his assignment in May 1954. It's here where a beautiful girl caught his eye at an officer's club dance. J learned that Pauly was a nurse from Canada who worked at a children's hospital in Sacramento. He asked her to marry him after four dates. She said "Yes," after five dates! It must have been in the stars!

Soon J was assigned to a B-36 crew in Ft Worth, Texas. He flew on 24-hour navigator missions. This was on B-36 planes with six prop engines and later four jets for more boost.

J took twelve days leave to go to Yorkton, Saskatchewan to get married to Pauly. You can't lose a good dance partner! The young couple began to travel. In 1955 J went to pilot training in Mission, Texas and

from there to Bryan, Texas for jet training. He then went to Elgin Air Force Base Field Nine in Florida and flew four different planes. By the time the family was sent to Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, they had two children. The next moves prepared J for the war in Vietnam. They moved to France, then to Ohio and from there to a large military base in Okinawa, Japan in March 1966. J's wife and four children lived with fair housing, a school, a beach, a hospital, and the company of other families. While J's family was in Okinawa, J flew missions in Vietnam and came back for several days at a time for rest and relaxation when possible before flying missions again. The Ricks' fifth and last child was born in Okinawa. They were there for about three and a half years.

From Vietnam, J went to Lockbourne Air Force Base, south of Columbus, Ohio. He was promoted to the rank of lieutenant colonel. He also earned two college degrees from the University of Nebraska, through a program called Operation Bootstrap. One degree was in business and the other in military science.

J's final move was to Forbes Air Force Base in Topeka in 1971. He was Director of Transportation and Squadron Commander. He retired in 1973.

What made this Air Force bombardier pilot who flew missions in Vietnam, who had a distinguished career, retiring as a lieutenant colonel most proud of his past

FEEL THE SPIRIT OF GOD

This time of year, when we are surrounded by windy conditions, I cannot help but think of Pentecost. Occurring fifty days after Easter, Pentecost is the day when Christians celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit amongst Christ’s apostles and the world.

We are told that on the day of Pentecost, a sound like a rushing wind swept through the crowd and tongues of fire were present. The imagery of rushing wind stands out at this time of year when I feel the wind gusting by me, tugging at my hair. I can imagine the Pentecostal scene. Everyone’s clothes and hair being whipped around in the sudden gale that sprung out of nowhere only to disappear again.

The wind is often shown as the spirit of God throughout the Bible, signifying the creative power of God and the breath of life. The spirit of God symbolized by wind can be

a powerful reminder in our daily lives of our connectivity to one another. Just as the Holy Spirit connects us to God, it also connects each of us to one another.

It is a connection of love that nothing can sever; despite safety measures or distance. This is a connection that enhances our resiliency in times of stress, as we know we are part of a larger community that is always there for us. Whether that community is that of the Family of God, or the smaller community we have here at Brewster, each one of us is connected.

As you spend time out-of-doors this month – or even sitting by an open window – take a moment to feel the wind on your skin. Feel the wind and think of these words from Nicolas Sparks’ *A Walk to Remember...* God’s “love is like the wind, you can’t see it but you can feel it.” ■

“A good cook knows that while she is waiting for her bread dough to rise — she can make all the beds in the house, practice a Bach fugue, and dig up and transplant all the pot-bound plants.”

I have always loved May Day, delivering May baskets to neighbors, family and friends. In our family we didn't do “fancy or complicated” when it came to May baskets. We made paper cones with paper handles, or used paper cups with ribbon handles. Always adding a flower or two and candy — usually fudge. The thrill was ringing the doorbell on the front porch and then running like mad to hide and giggle while waiting for someone to open the door.

FIVE MINUTE FUDGE

Mix 2/3 cup Carnation milk, 1 and 2/3 cup sugar and 1/2 tsp salt in a heavy saucepan. Bring to a boil, cook five minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add 16 medium, diced marshmallows and 1 and 1/2 cups chocolate chips plus vanillas flavoring. Stir vigorously for 1 minute, then pour into a buttered 8” pan. Cool and cut into squares. Wrap in wax paper then add to your May Day baskets. ■


BREWSTER VETERANS HALL OF HONOR CELEBRATIONS WEEK OF MAY 24
