WHAT'S AN APP?

A mobile application, also referred to as a mobile app or simply an app, is a computer program or software application designed to run on a mobile device such as a phone, tablet, or watch.

Smart devices are managed through the K4Connect Home Hub, and all data is hosted in the United States through Amazon Web Services (AWS). AWS' commitment to privacy and security ensures that data is kept safe and secure. Partners with access to data must meet stringent security requirements and are given access to only the data they require.

On October 18 all Independent Living residents will receive an email from K4Connect. This email will include a link to download K4Community Plus onto your mobile device. If you wish to begin using K4 before October 18, please contact Taylor at 274-3348 for more information.

DO I HAVE TO BE A PRO AT USING A COMPUTER OR SMART PHONE TO USE K4COMMUNITY PLUS?

No. K4Community Plus keeps residents effortlessly connected to family and friends, as well as Brewster Place by bringing everything they need to their fingertips in a senior-friendly application.

PUMPKIN BARS

- 3/4 cups flour
- 2 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp nutmeg
- 1 tsp powdered cloves
- 3 eggs beaten
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 cup sugar

Frosting

- 1 cup powered sugar
- 6 tabs soft butter
- 1 tsp Watkins vanilla
- 18 oz. package cream cheese

Sift dry ingredients and set aside. Add eggs and sugar mixing till fluffy, then beat in pumpkin. Add dry ingredients all at once. Put in a buttered jelly roll pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 15 minutes. When cool frost with cream cheese frosting. ■

EVERYONE HAS A Story to tell

reida Schriner has a gift with quilts. In her 30 years of making quilts, she has brought a two dimensional object a length and depth that surprises the viewer. A flat fabric may appear to playfully pop out. Colors sparkle and flash from within. Her way with fabric is amazing. Not surprising, she is well known in the local quilting community. She often shows her quilts at Brewster Place where she and her husband have lived for many years. Her lovely handwork is recognized and enjoyed. Recently, she spoke of how she began.

"When I retired from nursing in my fifties," she said, "I went to an art show at Washburn University. I saw the quilts and thought I would take a quilting class."

This was natural for Freida. Art is in her family background. "My family has a history in art," she said. "My mother was a seamstress, so I made my clothes for a while when I had the time. My grandmother drew pictures in chalk."

A lovely picture in chalk is displayed in Freida's home, made by her grandmother. It has an elegant, professional style. Artistic interests are in Freida's background.

Freida said, "I went to the Overbrook Quilt Guild and learned interesting ways of doing quilting. I learned so many things. This was many years ago, so I've had many years to identify and use what I learned. One important element they taught me in quilting was light, medium and dark." On a wall in Freida's living room is an example of light, medium and dark. The large piece is named **Bring the Flowers Inside**. It follows light, medium and dark across the shades throughout the pattern. It takes the breath away. It is amazing in it's construction and inner light, belying its two dimensions.

A small wall quilt seems to dance as it is viewed. It shows nine patches of tender vegetables and fragile heirloom culinary herbs, each with their own precious root systems and wee flowers. They are turned as if they grew on the patch. Looking more carefully, one sees that they are sewn with iridescent silk thread. The piece is breathtaking.

Freida has made flat fabrics appear to pop out, and has offered the viewer quilts with playfully bright bunches of adorable flowers in happy brilliant pitchers and interesting pots. She has just completed a lovely autumn quilt for the Brewster Bazaar. Her work is unique and amazing.

"People recognize my quilts," she says.

How do you do it? How do you create such incredible quilts time after time? "It seems natural to me," Freida says. "You have to have instinct. It is a gift." ■

WILLOW AND CYPRESS AT BHC

n 2005, Brewster Health Center embarked on a new and wonderful journey to fulfill the mission of person-centered care. Prior to that date, the health

"Whee Whee, I'm back in a tree, the winds may billow, I'm safe in Willow, Brewster has moved me, no change I see, well a little maybe, I'm back in a tree." Pat Kratina, Willow resident center was operated as one big building with 79 "beds" for residents to utilize when in need. The person-centered care mission turned BHC into a community with three separate neighborhoods with dedicated staff in each area. These neigh-

borhoods were named Meadowlark, Sunflower and Eagle Ridge. Each neighborhood was decorated and designed to feel like home. Eagle Ridge was the largest neighborhood with 36 individuals living there. Experts, research and our own experiences tell us the ideal size for a neighborhood that feels like home is around 20 individuals.

For the past several years, Brewster Health Center leadership has studied the possibility to make the Eagle Ridge neighborhood smaller. Earlier this September, we finally achieved that goal. Eagle Ridge will go down in our history as a wonderful neighborhood. We now have two new neighborhoods in our health center. The Willow neighborhood houses rooms 400 – 415 for a total of 22 people. The Cypress neighborhood houses rooms 500 – 507 for a total of 10 people. Each neighborhood will have its own dedicated staff during the day and evening. The residents from both neighborhoods will continue to dine together and spend time together in the common spaces. It is vital to continue to grow and improve as we commit to quality, person-centered care. This change will help us provide all our residents optimal quality of life!

WOMEN AND POLITICS: IS PART OF THE GLASS CEILING STILL HANGING?

Tuesdays, October 5, 12, and 19 1:00—3:00 pm | Main Street Chapel

The U.S. inaugurated its first woman vice president but still has not joined 70 other countries that have had women presidents or prime ministers. Since the 19th amendment in 1920, women have made progress on the political stage, but they often experience subtle or overt sexism. Going back to 1872, this course looks at women who ran for office and the challenges they faced from opponents and the media. Videos, political cartoons and newspaper headlines show that much has changed but many things have stayed the same over 100 years.

Instructor Bio: Diana Carlin, Ph.D., is Professor Emerita of Communication at Saint Louis University and a retired professor of Communication Studies at KU. She has co-authored a book on gender and politics and taught courses on women as political leaders, the rhetoric of women's rights and communication and gender.

CLIMATE CHANGE: MORE FIRES, FLOODS, DROUGHTS AND HURRICANES

Tuesdays, October 26 and November 2 and 9 1:00—3:00 pm | Main Street Chapel

Join us as we explore the causes and history of climate change and discuss how the planet has been uninhabitable five times in the ancient past due to climate change. Learn about the evidence available to indicate that climate change is occurring as we look at the various floods, droughts, fires and storms in 2021 and compare them historically. In addition, we will spend time considering the current programs and long-term solutions to stop climate change. The class will conclude with a discussion on "With great change comes great opportunity"; in short, new industries will blossom and some companies and industries will disappear.

Instructor Bio: Charles "Chick" Keller is a retired senior executive and retired professor. He worked 15 years at each Sprint, and Black and Veatch in strategic planning and strategic marketing raising to the VP level both times. In 2000 Chick began a career as a professor at the University of Kansas, Master of Engineering Management program where he taught Finance and Strategic Planning. ■
