erry Hinton was born on a farm in Wymore, Nebraska on June 12, 1919. He now resides in Topeka, Kansas at Brewster Place in the Redwood apartments overlooking the waving American flag. He is a tall, well-built man who seldom loses a gentle smile and a happy, "Hello!" to everyone he sees. He is approachable,

kind and easy to talk with. But Jerry Hinton has a life story few people would imagine.

"In 1941, right after Pearl Harbor, I entered the Selection Service in Hutchinson, Kansas. I went with two others and some Native Americans from Haskell to Fort Ord, California on Monterey Bay. I was to protect the west coast from a possible Japanese invasion at the time. Soon we were sent to Escondido, California, and then to Alabama on a train. We departed on a ship in New York and 14 days after I saw

the Statue of Liberty, we were docking in Liverpool, England. There were masts of ships and it was then that I saw World War II."

Corporal Jerry Hinton joined a large group of young men suiting up and preparing for the invasion of Normandy Beach. The large group of young men were gathered from all over the United States. They got their barracks bags and walked eight miles to the American camp.

"It was then that we got our 155 artillery guns with a six inch barrel and a 45 pistol for our hip," he said.

Jerry said that the service gave them some entertainment before they went into battle.

"We went to a USO show in England. They got 1,200 guys together and we saw Jack Benny on a flatbed truck, with a pretty girl singing. It was windy and Jack Benny held her skirt down. Everyone was yelling," he said. Jerry continued soberly, "then we went to Normandy."

Jerry explained, "In June 1944, they took us on LST ships (Landing Ship Tanks) that were built for World War II. It had two decks. Howitzers on the bottom decks, jeeps and soldiers manning the top deck. They put big canvas bal-

RESIDENT COUNCIL | STANDING COMMITTEES

Did you know that the first Brewster Place Resident Council was selected in 1964 and consisted of 10 members who represented the various floors and wings of the original Main Building (now Redwood)? Bylaws for Resident Council were first adopted in January 1965 and have stood the test of time with changes being suggested and approved when necessary. Standing committees were also formed, some of which are still active today.

PURPOSE OF RESIDENT COUNCIL — BYLAWS ARTICLE II

To provide residents with an orderly manner of communication with each other and with the management about matters of common interest, welfare, and concern.

STANDING COMMITTEES | BYLAWS ARTICLE VIII

The President, in consultation with the Executive Committee, shall appoint a Chairperson for each Standing Committee. In the interest of efficiency, all Standing Committee Chairpersons should work in cooperation with the Department Directors of the various services. Each Chairperson of a Standing Committee may select a Co-Chairperson, and may select additional members, if desired.

When necessary, the number of Standing Committees shall be increased or decreased by proper action of the Council.

Standing Committee job descriptions shall be given to each Committee Chairperson at the time of the appointment.

All Committees shall make regular reports to the Council.

loons held up by steel on the top, like dirigibles, so that the Germans by air couldn't strafe (attack by low-flying aircraft) us."

Jerry continued, "A soldier told us to charge. He said, 'I'm going to run you right up the sand rather than back onto the sea so you

stay away from the beach. The antiaircraft guys pulled their guns, the weapon carriers had their own weapons. They let 200 men leave the LST at a time. Before it was my time, I went back to the kitchen truck to get something to eat. A Kration was a box with three meals: one can with scrambled eggs and bacon, a box with cheese and an evening meal with meat and potatoes. A D-

ration box was just a large candy bar you could eat little by little or it would give you a belly ache. You could also get your cigarettes and your little sheets of toilet paper. Then you were ready to run up the sand."

The LST ships went back to the large vessels to reload men, artillery, and jeeps. At the same time, Allies were dropping paratroopers from the air. Allies were dropped behind the enemy lines. Thousands of men, equipment and jeeps were being off-loaded at the same time. The Germans were fortified at the top of the hills shooting down toward the sea as men crawled up. Streams of men and trucks found the road after they had neutralized the Germans. The soldiers then marched on to the next town.

After the Allied Forces took Normandy, they entered Saint-Lô, France in July 1944. The plan was to force the Germans to retreat along the hedgerows from small town to small town through France toward Germany. This was the period of the most intense fighting. Corporal Hinton bravely fought with the American troops, fought through the hedgerows, taking Orleans, Mortain and Van

Hough. Many of the hedgerow towns were littered with tanks, jeeps and wrecked trucks.

"In December 1944, we found ourselves in the Tanks of the Forest," Jerry said. "It was the forest of the tanks. The Nazis had tanks and tanks in the forest. It was the cold-

> 20,000 Americans were killed in this battle."

The Battle of the Bulge was over on January 25, 1945. After

est, snowiest winter they ever had. There was 10 inches of snow. They called it the Ardennes Offensive, between Belgium and Luxemburg. The Battle of the Bulge was the bloodiest battle for the Americans on the Western Front -

this battle, Corporal Hinton was sent to a hospital in Belgium for shrapnel wounds and recuperation. He remembers that he was physically and mentally exhausted. After his release, he returned to the service. The Germans had surrendered and Corporal Hinton worked in Germany for the United States government to govern the Germans on the Danube after the war.

When that job was completed, Corporal Hinton received \$300, and was taken out of the war. He was sent to Newport News, Virginia where he was part of a large welcome homecoming, complete with yelling, screaming, singing and United States flags. The war was over.

Jerry married a precious lady, Jean, and was married for 74 years before her death in November 2020. He says they never had an argument. Jean was a beloved member of the Brewster Place community. The Hintons have two sons, three granddaughters and one grandson. Jerry is proud to be 102 years young and will celebrate his 103rd birthday on June 12. ■
