The Brewster Bean at The Evergreens is an amazing place! Situated inside the north door, just adjacent to the welcome dpeesk, it plays host to **Coffee & Chat** every day from 9:00 am to “whenever.” All are welcome to enjoy coffee, tea, cocoa and lots of conversation. Men and women from all over campus come to talk, laugh and discuss. Often, there is laughter, sometimes political discussions, but always a dozen or more Brewster folks come together for fellowship and a cuppa. Residents find new friends including BrewsterConnect members who also attend. Usually one can find pastry, donuts, or sweet rolls of some type. Occasionally, a member of the group will come and contribute a pan of cookies or brownies, banana bread or scones. But most importantly, there is always fellowship and meeting friends. ***Just ask Lou Arnold...keep reading below!***

Lou Arnold is a resident at The Evergreens and comes to Coffee & Chat almost every day. This sweet and pretty lady is always dressed in a beautiful smile. Lou’s name is actually Louida, taken from both of her grandmothers. She is beloved by the group and always finds a chair and coffee whenever she comes.



Lou said she grew up on a farm in Burlington, Kansas and she had brothers who were 10, 6, 4 and 2 years older than her. She was the only girl in the family and she was a daddy’s girl.

Lou tells that she grew up in the Great Depression and it was hard. Her mother soaked and put up sheets at the windows and doors to keep the dust out. She had to change the sheets three or four times a day.

Lou commented that they were poor but they didn’t know it; everybody was poor. “My mother baked bread,” said Lou. She continued, “Breakfast was a large meal. Mother made pancakes, wheat puffed from the threshing machine, eggs and bacon. By the time the men came in from working the cattle and doing chores, they had already worked four or five hours. Then, the boys had to clean up and go to school. Mom made cinnamon rolls, bread and apples for the boys to take to school.”

Lou said that it was a mile to school. “They made a sled and pulled me to school in that sled,” she commented. Continuing, she said, “Or we’d skate. We had skate keys when we went to the one-room school house.”

“My dad grew potatoes and turnips,” Lou said. “He took the vegetables in sacks to the post office for people to take if they needed food. Those sacks were useful in those hard times,” she said.

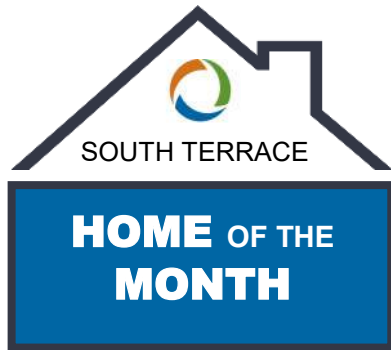
