# EVERYONE HAS A STORY TO TELL

**P**atricia Watson says, “I am a proud daughter of the Mississippi River. I could see a levee from the house where I was born, only a block away. The Mississippi River changed its course and I moved from an Oxbow Lake that was once the big river. We crossed the lake at sunrise or sunset in a double rowing racing skiff.”



As we celebrate Black History Month, we get to learn about the life of Patricia Watson who grew up knowing about racial inequality in southern Louisiana in Terrebonne Parish. In 2017, *The Riverside Reader*, a local newspaper in Louisiana, told the story of 16-year-old Patricia and her friends. They called themselves the Freedom Riders before the term was officially coined in the 1960s. Young Patricia was active in helping poor and black families rent homes while she was still in high school.

As a young white woman in the deep south, being a Civil Rights Activist at such a young age was dangerous, but to Patricia, it was the right thing to do. And it was something that was instilled in her by her mother who grew up in New York, where there was more racial diversity. In addition, as a person of Italian heritage, when Patricia’s mother moved to the south as a child, she also experienced racism.

In high school Patricia became an activist for civil rights through the Young Christian Students (YCS), which was sponsored by the Catholic church. Participation in this organization allowed Patricia to travel to

other states, see the effects of segregation and act to change it. In fact, in the summer of 1960, Patricia and her friends in the Young Christian Students traveled to Chicago for a convention where they took part in a civil rights protest at Woolworth’s. This experience inspired Patricia to take a stand against segregation in Louisiana. She continued her work while attending Southeastern Louisiana University to attain her education degree. While at college she helped migrant workers and their children by teaching English and doing what was necessary to help them have better lives.

Now, we fast forward to the year 2020 when Patricia remembered that, “Our son, who lives in Lawrence, Kansas moved us up here because of five hurricanes in Louisiana.” Patricia and her husband Richard found Brewster Place and Brewster Place lovingly found Patricia and her kind heart.

Today, Patricia writes and sends many cards and letters to her friends at Brewster Place — residents and employees alike. Her lovely, sweet art adorns many cards. She writes loving letters, original poems, and beautiful mementoes to people for birthdays, special days or those who may need an emotional boost. She is active in many clubs and is loved for her kindness and compassion.

We have witnessed firsthand Patricia’s kindness at Brewster Place and now we have gotten to know about the roots of her compassion.

Patricia said, “I have always been an activist, assisting others to be all they can be. For my philosophy is; love is what we do, because actions speak louder than words.” ■

## IDENTITY OF WOODSHOP BOWL

**I**f you attended the Info Fair in January, you probably stopped by the Brewster Woodshop table where the fellas had a guessing contest to identify a unique wooden bowl.

The bowl on display was known as a hair receiver. Hair receivers were common on the dressing tables of women from the Victorian era through the 1950s. They were used to collect hair from hair brushes for a variety of purposes: making hair art, filling pincushions or other small pillows, or for creating elaborate hair styles.

According to woodshop member Don Buchanan, most of the hair was collected by the average woman to be used for pincushions. Because hair washing wasn't done as often as it is now, hair contained a lot of oil and was used in pincushions to prevent rusting. Stainless steel and plated steel no longer made the need for oil in pincushions so other methods of storage became popular.

Don commented that almost all of his aunts and grandmother had pincushions on their arms when sewing and quilting.

Two people knew what the bowl was used for, and Judy Craig was the winner in the two-person drawing. ■

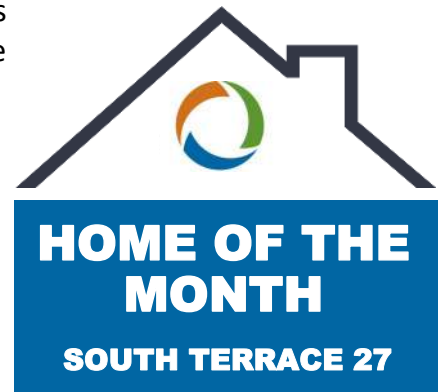
