n October 2022 the Brewster Place community was gifted with a lovely new couple who moved to The Evergreens, Ray and Betty Lippe. Several residents already knew the Lippes through their community associations. The Lippes are active members of First United Methodist Church. Ray's career was in journalism and Betty was a private piano teacher. Betty has also volunteered playing piano at the Cotton O'Neil Cancer Center on a monthly basis. The Lippes fit comfortably into the Brewster Place family.

Ray and Betty met on a blind date at Kansas State University. After they were married, they lived in several cities and states before permanently settling in Topeka in 1972. They have two sons, David and Darren, who live close, and four grandchildren and one great grandchild.

For 40 years, the Lippes enjoyed traveling. They went on 15 overseas cruises and 43 Roads Scholar Tours in the United States — including Alaska and Hawaii. They enjoyed these trips very much and Ray wrote about their vacations in a series of notebooks which are kept in their home. The details and fine points of their wonderful visits will never be lost.

The Lippes also bring with them a story of a fascinating interest that the entire family has shared throughout the years — it involves Zell Pottery.

Ray's mother and Betty's father had original Zell Baby Pottery dishes and neither of them knew they had this common family history until later. After they were married, they had "a lot of fun" going to antique stores finding and collecting old Zell Pottery.

Ray traveled for his work, and he stopped in antique stores to find the old Zell Pottery. Ray said, "The old Zell was from 1900-1910 and looked older and was sometimes chipped."

The Lippes collected over 200 pieces of G.S. Zell Pottery, much of which has been shared with members of their family. They say that the pottery "reflects charming little Dutch children, cleanliness, freshness, sweetness and the nurturing life." They added that the pottery, "represented a good life, having fun, family, enjoying the searching."

Ray and Betty are involved in many classes and programs at Brewster Place and we are certainly glad they chose to join our community.

Presidential Debates:

Why We Watch and Why They Matter

Tuesday, October 17, 24 and 31 1:00—3:00 pm Cultural Arts Center

After a 16-year gap between 1960 and 1976, general election presidential debates have occurred in every election cycle. This course explores the history of presidential debates—both their high and low points—and looks ahead to the 2024 primary and possible general election debate seasons. We'll discuss why we watch them and why they matter.

Instructor: Diana Carlin, Ph.D., is professor emerita of communication at Saint Louis University and a retired professor of communication studies at KU. Carlin has written several articles and co-authored a book on gender and politics. She also taught courses on women as political leaders, the rhetoric of women's rights, and communication and gender.

A Family, Freud, and Friendliness: The Menninger Clinic in Topeka

Fridays, November 17; December 1 and 8 1:00—3:00 pm Cultural Arts Center

Beginning in a Topeka farmhouse, the Menninger Clinic became a psychiatric hospital that treated patients and trained clinicians from across the globe. We'll review the clinic's founding family who directed it for 75 years, until its move to Houston. We'll also examine how patients were treated and what the clinic contributed to Topeka and vice versa.

Instructor: Karl Menninger retired from a legal career in federal and state government, mostly dealing with issues concerning persons with disabilities. He teaches courses on disabilities and the law and the insanity defense at the University of Missouri—Kansas City School of Law. ■

The Brewster Place Gardens and Grounds Committee is one of the many committees of Resident Council. Co-chairs of the committee are residents Bruce Bower, Julian Efird and Lonna Reinecke with staff support from Groundskeeper Josh Saunders and Activities Coordinator Jamie Fritz. With our beautiful 35-acre campus, this committee is very active and involved. They meet every third Thursday at 1:30 pm in the Main Street Chapel.

GREAT TOMATO CONTEST

'One tomato, two tomatoes, three tomatoes, four...'

It's tomato season and everyone who grows tomatoes wants to show off their crop. The Gardens and Grounds Committee decided to have a contest where each resident building would submit a plant for this healthy competition.

Look around and you'll see more tomatoes on our campus as part of the Great Tomato Contest. They can be seen on patios, porches, and planted in containers or garden plots. Plants have been variously watered daily (morning and/or evening), several times per week, or when the contestant saw the need, and fed a variety of nutrients including egg shells, coffee grounds, bananapeel-soaked water, and treated with fertilizer, Miracle Gro and sprayed with Neem oil. One participant even stuck plastic forks (tines up) in the ground (to ward off critters?).

Although all tomato plants were the same variety, and were started in same-sized pots, with the same soil type, and from the same nursery, yields ranged from blossoms to several large fruits — a whopping 17! (Alice Bowser attributes her success to talking to and touching her crop). As of this writing, no one has tried playing classical music or reading them poetry.

STAFF SMOKING POLICY UPDATE

In January 2003 Brewster Place became a "tobacco free" campus as part of our wellness first initiative. At that time, a few exceptions were allowed for current residents who smoked. The policy was updated in 2006 to create a truly "tobacco free" campus that included all residents, staff, vendors and guests. With regard to employees, a smoke break required them to clock out and leave campus. Today, in an effort to be more flexible with this policy, two on-campus designated smoking areas have been added for employees only.

Designated Staff Smoking Locations:

- Southeast side of the Brewster Health Center
- 2. Loading dock behind the Brewster Events Center

To keep our campus clean, each area includes a tall, black ash tray. Staff may use these designated areas for their smoke breaks without clocking out (during

their regular 15-minute required breaks).

In addition, staff will have the option to sit in their vehicles to smoke if they would prefer. However, they need to ensure they are using their own ash trays and not disposing of cigarette butts in the parking lot or anywhere on campus grounds. Outside of individual cars, the only place cigarette butts should be disposed of on the Brewster Place campus, is in the ashtrays in the above designated smoking areas.

As we begin this new policy for Brewster Place staff, please keep in mind we will be monitoring staff to make sure the policy is being followed. Improper disposal of cigarettes, misuse of 15-minute breaks, or inappropriate behavior with regard to the policy could result in disciplinary action.
