awrence Foth opened the door of his home with a smile and the first thing I saw were beautiful quilts. Lawrence's wife, Roberta, was covered with a brilliant red and star applique quilt that spoke of Christmas. Another lovely bright quilt lay casually on a chair and the far wall had a lovely hand-built storage shelf that held at least 100 neatlyfolded applique quilts. I smiled at Roberta, whom I had never met.

"You love quilts," I said with a grin. Roberta responded, "Oh my. I grew up around quilting. My mother and grandmother were quilters."

Roberta has a Kansas story to tell. She said, "I grew up on a farm in western Kansas near Protection which is south of Greensburg. My dad and brother took care of crops and livestock while my sister and I helped Mom with the dairy herd and chickens.

Lawrence lived in Henderson, Nebraska. His dad was the school principal and his mom was the community nurse. There was not a doctor living nearby, so she would visit sick people and phone the doctor. The doctor would give directions on how to dispense medications that he had provided for her after she received the doctors orders. Lawrences' mother was instrumental in raising money to build the very first hospital.

In 1950, a very unfortunate accident at a county intersection killed most of Lawrence's family — his mom, dad and young sister. Lawrence and his brother and sister



were placed with relatives in central Kansas. Lawrence spent most of his growing up years with his 72 year old grandfather and stepgrandmother in Hillsboro, Kansas.

Lawrence went to college at Friends University where he met Roberta. They started their teaching careers in Howard, Kansas — Lawrence in industrial arts and Roberta in home economics. They have two children and four grandchildren. In their 62 years of life together, their church has always been important.

Lawrence has built a lifetime of beautiful furniture for their home including cabinets, tables and decorative pieces that very few people could build.

After teaching seven years, Lawrence accepted the job as Curriculum Specialist in the State Department of Education, and later became Executive Director of the State Advisory Council on Vocational Education. He has enjoyed involvement in several businesses and is currently an estimator for Carpet One.

Roberta enjoys quilting and has done beautiful quilts since 1988. She has won many first in show and first place ribbons over the years. She has been featured in the newspaper and is known in the area for her beautiful work.

The Foths enjoy living at Brewster Place and are interested in their beautiful birds around their apartment. They are a wonderful couple meeting new friends all around campus. ■ **LENT — A TIME OF RENEWEL AND GROWTH**





BREWSTER PLACE — A DREAM AND LEAP OF FAITH

THE BREWSTER PLACE STORY — PART 2 BY JANIS SWANSON, EDITOR

The image below was from a brochure that was distributed in 1961 when the retirement home was no more than a blueprint and known as "The Congregational Home." Note the absence of balconies which were added later and the location of the home was identified as Holliday Square.



The story of Brewster Place is an extraordinary one. Beginning in 1958 as the dream of Roy and Frances Engler who envisioned a safe and comfortable home for their aunt and other seniors in the community, the story of Brewster Place is in many ways a shared leap of faith.

Making this particular dream come true was going to be a monumental task. There were so many unknowns, questions, challenges and uncertainties. Building a home of this type was new and innovative and there were no instructions or guidelines to follow. With no money, no blueprints, and no land on which to build, the architects of this huge project had to rely on their own faith as well as the support of countless Congregational church members, Topeka community and business leaders, and the newly hired Executive Director Nathan Barr.

When Nathan Barr reported for duty on January 2, 1961, Rev. Ned Burr McKinney found him a room in a private home to live. In addition, board member and owner of J.C. Sargent Mortgage and Investment Company, J. Churchill Sargent, offered him a desk in the basement of one of his buildings. With no typewriter or phone and only a desk drawer and his briefcase, Nathan Barr made this humble office work for the first few months of his tenure.

In June 1961 Nathan Barr's wife joined him in Topeka, and the couple moved into the Stone House which had been acquired by the board thanks to a \$50,000 loan from J. Churchill Sargent. This also included the five adjoining acres. Mr. Barr's first priorities included reorganizing the various board committees, and making their tasks more specific. The committees included: Recruitment and Admissions Committee, Services and Program Committee, Publicity Committee, Building and Grounds Committee and Finance Committee.

The Finance Committee needed to set up sound financial policies and procure adequate finances to build the home. It had been decided earlier that a Federal Housing Authority (FHA) loan would be the best route. An early challenge was that the FHA

had plans for housing for the aged *and* plans for infirmaries/nursing homes, but they had no plans for a combined nursing home and housing unit. This project was indeed a new concept and would later become a model for other communities.

Since 1959, the Board had been meeting with Don Depew of Ekdahl, Davis and Depew Architects. Don had provided tentative drawings and plans, but to move forward, detailed architectural drawings would need to be completed. But how would the Board pay for this expensive, but necessary, step? With financing of the project still yet to be determined, would Ekdahl, Davis and Depew Architects invest their time and efforts on a project that might not become reality, resulting in no funds to pay them for their efforts. When Mr. Ekdahl asked his associates about taking this risk, they said yes. Don Depew and Nathan Barr then spent days and weeks reading through the intricacies of the FHA specifications that would later translate into blueprints of buildings, apartments, lounges and offices.

The hours of work culminated in the 90 page prospectus and application that was submitted to the FHA on November 28, 1961. On April 17, 1962 the board was informed that the loan insurance commitment for \$2,136,600 had been received from the FHA. Not surprisingly, the FHA was impressed by the prospectus as being a wonderfully detailed and comprehensive plan for a retirement home. It was suggested that this plan could be made into a handbook for the use of other groups building retirement homes. The handbook never came to fruition, but other communities did follow the example set by The Congregational Home.

With funding secured, the next step began preparing working architectural plans and readying the building site for construction. In addition, plans for a ground-breaking were finalized, and on Sunday, December 2, 1962, a ceremony was held marking the beginning of making this dream a reality. Due to an agreeable winter, construction got underway and the five-story building we now know as Redwood was near completion by January 1963. Amazingly, in April 1963 the first residents moved in to Brewster Place.


