cery shopping and other errands, but Auntie did not want to be a burden to them. The Englers feared that Auntie wouldn't call them when she needed help, so they looked for other living options. At that time the only suitable home in Topeka for seniors was the Methodist Home for the Aged — which was full and had no place for their dear aunt. The Englers wondered why other churches in Topeka hadn't built homes for seniors. One day, Roy Engler said to his wife, "Why don't we offer our church ten acres of our farm for a building site. Maybe we could start something." The Englers did indeed start something.

Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote, "Do not follow where the path may lead. Go instead where there is no path and leave a trail." The Englers, along with the founders of Brewster Place, embodied this quote perfectly. In previous issues of the Brewster News, we have highlighted the challenges the founders faced, the roadmap they created to build such a home, and the incredible early volunteers and staff members who made the dream a reality. But what is a beautiful new home without residents? This month we will look at how the first residents made Brewster Place their home.

When Executive Director Nathan Barr arrived in Topeka in 1961 to begin the hard work of building Brewster Place, he immediately began

learning about Topeka and meeting with the various groups from the four Congregational churches. He attended picnics, chili suppers and social gatherings. These meetings became known as "Buzz and Chatter" groups and served as the way to publicize the vision



Young Generals of the American Civil War

During the American Civil War, the United States Army grew exponentially in size. In order to command the increased number of troops, general officers were created from younger members of the military. This class will focus on the generation of young leaders who served in the ranks of the Union Army attaining senior military positions outside the traditional norm. The class will look at the careers and war making abilities of officers in both the Western and Eastern Theaters. The first class will examine the military exploits of Western Theater generals William T. Sherman, Benjamin Grierson, Judson Kilpatrick, and John Schofield. The second class will move to the Eastern Theater and focus on Union generals Winfield Hancock, John Gibbon, George McClellan, Alfred Pleasonton, and Joshua Chamberlain. The last class will examine the Civil War careers of three of the youngest Union generals that attained senior rank, George Custer, Philip Sheridan, and Darius Couch. ■

TOTAL SOLAR ECLIPSE

orth America will experience its second total solar eclipse in seven years. The moon will glide over the surface of our sun, casting a shadow over a swath of the Earth below. Along the path, the world will turn dark as night. It will start at sunrise in Mexico and travel throughout the day to end in Canada.

Topeka is not in the direct path but should be able to see 90% of the eclipse assuming and hoping for no clouds.

Important Details for Event

- Eclipse glasses will be sold in The Market for \$3 starting April 1. One per resident, please.
- The Brewster Choir will sing at 1:00 pm in the Cultural Arts Center
- After the choir sings, we will move to the top level of the parking garage.
- Maximum coverage will occur at 1:53pm lasting four minutes.

Please note that it is never safe to look directly at the sun. Protective eye equipment will be necessary. ■

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and hopefully recruit residents. At first it was a hard sell since there were no drawings or plans to show prospective residents. But once plans for the apartments, together with an artist's sketch of the building were available, the interest in the home grew. In fact, a small efficiency apartment was set up in the basement of Central Church by the Publicity Committee. This allowed future residents the opportunity to see how a small space could provide everything they needed with the added safety and security of living in a senior community.

Applicants had to be 62 years of age or older and were required to make an initial Accommodation Fee, which depending on the size and location of the apartment, ranged from \$7,750 to \$23,900. Apartments that were larger, facing west or on higher floors were deemed more desirable so were more expensive. By November 1961 Mr. Barr had 20 approved applications (the majority from Congregational churches) — even before there was assurance the home would be built.

Interestingly, in the beginning applications were reviewed by the Admissions Committee who would recommend to the Board of Directors its acceptance for rejection. It didn't take long to realize this process was too complicated and took too long. Amazingly, after five years of planning it only took a little over a year to complete the main building. The first residents to arrive were Mr. Lester Filson and Mrs. Darlene Newby who both moved in on April 10, 1964, five weeks before the dedication of the building, and before all walks, drives and sidewalks were in place. By the end of April, 29 people lived at Brewster Place.
