**"Simple Gifts"** has been sung in churches and schools, at funerals and weddings, and even performed at presidential inaugurations. It is a universal favorite because of its effortless tune and uncomplicated message. Its simplicity is its spirt — its soul.

This year the complexities of an unforeseen virus forced us to live more simply, for our own sake as well as for the sake of others. Planned trips, gatherings, events, classes, activities, meals, weddings, funerals and celebrations have all taken a back seat as we focused on keeping our community safe. Each of us has made sacrifices for the good of the whole. # EVERYONE HAS A STORY TO TELL KATHY HOWARD

athy Kysar Howard's life has been filled with activity. She enjoyed a loving 65 year marriage with her husband, Chuck, three children, and four grandchildren. She has filled her life with travels around the world, many lovely experiences in many countries, and friends she has met along the way. Kathy is a published author who has researched her ancestry into a sought-after book. The volume was requested by, and placed in the Library of Congress. Kathy is renowned for her stunning way with planted flowers and for fashioning beautiful flower beds.

The Kysar famly came from Germany in the 1700s to claim some free land offered in new territories across the sea. The clan first settled in Pennsylvania and Indiana. Part of the group advanced across into British Columbia, settling in Victoria, British Columbia. A great-great-grandfather became a teacher and leader of the Episcopal church there. Another branch of the family rode horse and wagon to western Kansas and settled in Trego County, also hoping to find free land and a new life. They lived in a soddie. They were Kathy's people.

Kathy's mother, Edith Kysar, was a remarkable woman. She was a kind and natural helper and support for people in need. She was described as "wonderful." Edith made clothes for needy children, helped

solve problems and gave her daughter an enthusiasm for working with the soil and taught her how to plant an attractive flower bed. Kathy still carries the love of planting flowers today. Kathy's father was mayor of Quinter for 20 years.

When Kathy grew up, she met Chuck Howard who came to Quinter to work for Kathy's dad. He became a professional scouter, and they lived in Hays, Norton, Des Moines, Iowa, and Columbia, Missouri before moving to Topeka. In Topeka, Chuck and Kathy bought an old fraternity house on College Avenue and 17th Street, close to the Washburn University campus. The 5,000 square foot house needed a complete renovation. "It had three stories, three apartments, four baths...oh, I don't know," Kathy said, "It was enormous." She shook her head. "We gutted it and did it all over again." After months of work, they stood before a new, beautiful home, ready for gracious living. And now that they had such a house, the couple could rent it out to legislators while they traveled!

Kathy's sister and husband bought an apartment in Paris next to the Invalides. "It was a wreck," Kathy said. We spent a month there renovating it with them. They rewired, repainted, repaired plaster and refinished floors to their original glory. The dreary old apartment now looked like a

Family meals always began with grace at the kitchen table where we would hold hands as we sang grace. Now I am living alone at Brewster Place as the pandemic is raging through the hallways. I ponder these memories as I stir up my favorite traditional Christmas Jam.

### **MOM'S CHRISTMAS JAM — 1972**

- One pound fresh cranberries-grind with water in blender and then drain them
- Thaw three 10 oz. bags of frozen strawberries or raspberries
- Combine with one box Sure-Jell in a large pan
- Stir in pectin and let set for a few minutes
- Then stir in one Tablespoon butter to reduce foaming. Bring to a rolling boil
- Stir in 3-4 cups sugar (have ready). Return to full boil for one minute. Skim foam. Ladle into jars. Keep jam in fridge

**HINT:** Start saving jars before Christmas. Any kind of small jar. To make them festive, tape Christmas bows to the lids. Then tie a little note, "Keep in fridge," where jam will keep for a few months.

My favorite Christmas thought comes from a little wooden sign my daughter gave to me...."Dear Santa, I can explain!"

houghts of Christmas bring wonderful memories from my past. Holiday dinners at my grandparents in Exira, Iowa would include one of my favorites. Iowa ham balls!

The meat is a combination of ground pork and smoked ham, which you can get from the butcher or do it yourself in a food processor. These freeze well too!

### **IOWA HAM BALLS**

- 2 lbs ground pork
- 2 lbs ground ham
- 2 c. ground graham cracker crumbs
- 3 eggs beaten
- 1 1/2 c. milk

### SAUCE

- 1 can tomato soup
- 1/2 c water
- 1/2 c vinegar
- 1 1/2 c brown sugar
- 1 tsp ground mustard

- Preheat the oven to 350 degrees and grease a 9X13 pan with cooking spray.
- In a bowl combine the ground pork, ground ham, graham cracker crumbs, beaten eggs, and milk. Use your hands, mix to combine.
   Form into 2 inch balls.
- Place in greased dish.
- In another bowl combine the tomato soup, brown sugar, vinegar, and mustard.Pour this over the ham balls.
- Bake for 1 hour... baste halfway through to coat with glaze.

The Christmas season is upon us. Yes, this year will be different as we are in the midst of a pandemic. If there has ever been a year, it is this year that we need some joy. We need Christmas trees, lights, decorations, Christmas cards, nativities, Christmas villages, poinsettias, and some mistletoe.

Have you noticed that radio stations were playing Christmas music before Thanksgiving, Christmas movies started running in mid-November, and people decorated for the holidays much earlier than usually this season? It is because in 2020 – we need a little joy in our life.

But let us not forget the real meaning of Christmas. The events that took place over 2000 years ago in a faraway town called Bethlehem are why we celebrate Christmas. Now Joseph was a righteous man, so he had decided to divorce Mary privately rather than exposing her to public disgrace. Breaking an engagement in those days required a divorce. But the angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph and explained that the child Mary was carrying was the creation of the Holy Spirit. He told Joseph not to be afraid and to name the child, Jesus, for He would save His people from their sins.

Joseph decided to go through with the marriage, but before the wedding ceremony, he was sent out of town to register in his ancestral hometown of Bethlehem, many days' journey to the south. Even though she was in the advanced stages of her pregnancy, Mary traveled with Joseph. After they reached Bethlehem, Mary "...gave birth to her first born, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn" (Luke 2:7). And LOVE WAS BORN!

Yes, the way we celebrate Christmas this year will be different. Your traditions may change; you may not be able to put up a Christmas tree or listen to Christmas concerts, you may not be able to go to church for a candlelight service with family or be served communion, you may not be able to sit with others around the dinner table or see your family. That's okay, because Christmas is about Christ. Christmas is about when LOVE WAS BORN! Merry Christmas!
