GIVE THE WORLD THE BEST YOU HAVE ANYWAY.


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Getting to Know Our Residents

Home and Community Based Services

B rewster at Home is the division of Brewster from which all home and community based programs are delivered. As we look back on 2015, it's evident that Brewster at Home had a busy year!



We began the year with new branding for our membership program, which we previously called Brewster at Home. The new name, BrewsterConnect, better reflects what the membership provides to the member — connection to

Brewster Place for activities, wellness/fitness offerings and intellectual programming. BrewsterConnect also provides connection to technology offerings to reinforce a member's decision to age in place as well as a connection to a vetted vendor network.

In July, we launched Live Well at Home by Brewster. This life care program provides wellness initiatives and health coaching, and as needs change and the member ages in place in their own home, coordination of care and services to include skilled care. Live Well members can truly live their entire lives in their own home. Currently we have five members of Live Well at Home by Brewster with a goal of having 30 by end of 2016.

Some of the comments of our members include:

"This program really gives us peace of mind."

"We can concentrate on being adult children and enjoying Mom while you all coordinate and oversee her healthcare needs when that time comes."

"We never want to move into a community, we have invested in making our home accessible and aging friendly."

"This program fixes our costs for long term care needs."

We have conducted Live Well seminars in Topeka, Lawrence and Manhattan. Our plan for this year includes adding Emporia and Kansas City to our membership base.

Brewster at Home continues to look for opportunities to serve seniors in their homes in the Topeka community and beyond. Technology allows us to extend our reach and provide medication management, personal emergency response as well as health monitoring. We follow industry trends and strategically develop programs that provide value and benefit to our area seniors. With everything we do we adhere to our mission, to serve wherever seniors call home.



Progress continues on the Main Street project on the lower level of Assisted Living. Phase I is complete which includes our beautiful new Chapel. Vespers services and Christmas Eve services have already taken place in the new space. Everyone is pleased with the bigger space, new furnishings and sound system.

The Main Street Lounge is also open and residents and staff have already begun using the space for sharing a meal or snack along with a cup of coffee. Large screen TVs are available if you would like to watch your favorite team play. The gorgeous fireplace is also a favorite place to gather during this winter season.

Phase II is underway and we expect the new expanded Market to be ready for business February 8. Once the Market is complete, work will begin to transform the new Winchell Wellness Center, therapy space and beauty shop.

Snow Clean-Up at Brewster Place

W ith winter upon us, some of you have had questions about what Brewster Place does when we have a snow or ice storm. Our current practice is as follows:

Brewster Place hires a snow removal company with larger equipment to do our roads on campus. They will arrive in the early morning hours and remove snow and return with sand and salt when needed. They also treat our roads upon request the day after a storm and following.

The Brewster Place maintenance team arrives early on snow days to clean entry ways and sidewalks. This often takes until well after lunch on the day of a storm depending on snow accumulation. After clearing the sidewalks and egress paths from the buildings, the team will go back and put down ice melt where needed. We do appreciate your calls to let us know if you find icy spots we have missed or that reappear.

As a rule, the maintenance team does not clean out carports or clean off patios except upon request. We do not charge extra for this service, but it takes a lot of manpower, and the maintenance team needs to get back to what they do best, and that is keeping your homes operational. We are able to remove snow from these areas on subsequent days after the snowfall, but not necessarily on the day of — so we ask for your patience. If you need to get out, or have a special circumstance, please call Kim at the work order hotline (274-3399) and we will get to you as soon as possible.

If you are concerned about getting there from your home, please know we will have a shuttle running to provide transportation to and from.


