‘T is the season to reflect on the passing year and to look forward to the next. The year 2019 was an especially significant year for me personally as I was honored to be selected to serve Brewster as its fifth Chief Executive Officer. I will always remember 2019 as a year of great challenges, growth, and sense of accomplishment.

We began 2019 with a significant reorganization that touched nearly every department on campus. In addition, we reevaluated the business plan, reduced our overhead costs, and moved to assure we had the right people in the right places to make us more efficient as well as to set us on solid financial footing for years to come. I asked our team members to work harder and longer, to be more creative, more patient, and more generative, and they responded in an impressive fashion. I am so proud to work with this talented group of people.



In January 2019, Chief Financial Officer Larry Riggins, Vice President of Operations Lea Chaffee and I met with roughly one hundred residents — in groups of six to eight — to gain perspectives, insights, and suggestions from across campus. While the sessions identified everything from specific cracks in sidewalks to the long range plan for Brewster, a few specific themes emerged session after session.

Services you can trust — Residents highlighted the many services and amenities available at Brewster that are delivered with the highest quality. From health care supports and services to transportation, security, maintenance and laundry, it was evident residents were proud of the quality of the Brewster brand. It was clear that maintaining and improving the quality of our services must be an ongoing priority. The road of quality improvement has no end, and we will never exhaust our need or our efforts to improve, but these efforts have produced fruit. I'd like to mention just a few areas of note.

Brewster Health Center has been the best in Topeka for years, but this status is constantly challenged by competitors, new regulatory requirements, and competitive demand for the best staff. We saw all of these challenges and more last year while maintaining the highest rankings possible from federal and state rating systems for the quality of our services. Addi-

tionally, Brewster Health Center continues to be recognized as a statewide leader for its success providing person-centered care. Most importantly though, the care and commitment of staff for the residents of Brewster Health Center is as great as ever, and the residents are reporting higher levels of satisfaction than they have in the last several years.

Brewster's **Home Health and Therapy** teams both worked very hard this year to maximize benefits to Brewster residents. Home Health services at Brewster Place have been provided on a private pay only basis for years. By partnering with **Meadowlark Hills Home Health** agency, our Home Health and Therapy teams worked to provide over 1,000 home health and therapy visits that were reimbursed by Medicare.

Dining is the single service most correlated with resident satisfaction as we measure it through our surveys, and rightly so. As I speak with members of the **Dining Services** teams, they report an eagerness to pursue requests and improvements they have identified as well as suggestions expressed by residents. This eagerness to provide residents with meals they enjoy and can be proud to share with their friends and families has advanced the overall satisfaction with the dining program in 2019.

In Redwood, the Dining Services team underwent a focused improvement effort from spring through summer which resulted in an increase in reported satisfaction from 2.9 stars (out of 5) to 4.7 stars. There is always more work to be done with such important programs, but I could not be more pleased with this team for their efforts this year.

Hard work continued on the expansion project in 2019, but we also continued to invest in our existing campus, completing

extensive renovations on apartments, improving commons spaces, caring for the grounds, and opening new amenities such as the Brewster Bean.

Throughout the listening tour, residents described the importance they place on open communication, and the easy accessibility of senior leadership. I certainly agree with the importance of this, and it is my hope that everyone on campus feels comfortable visiting the executive offices in The Evergreens. You are also welcome to call us or approach me and my leadership team for any reason, at any time. I enjoy receiving visitors in my office, but my hope for 2020 is to better seek you out and meet you where you are.

The community of people at Brewster is second to none and I feel blessed to be a part of this special place alongside you. We have many exciting pursuits planned for 2020 and I look forward to sharing these with you in the coming weeks and months. Happy New Year!
