### Older Americans Month | Blaze a Trail

ay is a month of fresh beginnings. Perennials bloom once again, blazing a trail of bright color. May is also when we celebrate Older Americans Month. This year's theme, "Blaze a Trail," emphasizes the ways older adults are reinventing themselves through new work and new passions, engaging their communities, and blazing a trail of positive impact on the lives of people of all ages. As part of Older Americans Month, we want to share a unique story written by resident Jack Renander. This story is about a beloved painting finding a permanent home. More than that, however, it's a story about family heritage, commitment, perseverance and love.

### Finding a New Home by Jack Renander

My first contact with Mr. Carl R. Schmidt was in the Fall of 1959 when I rented a back room in a house that he and his wife owned in San Ber-

nardino, California. Mr. Schmidt lived next door, and we frequently had conversations that always gravitated to his professional passion—art.

On one occasion, he showed me his upper floor studio with its large number of charcoal three-fourth



to life-sized drawings that were mounted on pullout rollers. He informed me that the drawings were done when he was an art student at the Art Institute of Chicago and that John Henry Vanderpoel was his instructor.

After my short stay at my temporary residence, I didn't see Carl Schmidt again until 1963, at which time I asked him if he would consider doing a 'Swedish' painting for me, and he agreed to my request. It would be a gift to my father, Walter W. Renander. Mr. Schmidt asked for a photograph and I furnished three Kodachrome slides, which I had taken while on leave from my army camp in Kaiserslautern, Germany in July, 1957.

### Wellness Clinics on Main Street to Open

Beginning in May we are adding two new components to our wellness initiative—the Wellness Hearing Clinic and the Wellness Skin Clinic. Both clinics will be held monthly in the Outpatient Therapy Clinic on Main Street.

The first Friday of every month (beginning May 6) from 12:00 pm—4:00 pm, we will have Audiology Services from Topeka Ear Nose and Throat. Jessica Whalen, AuD, CCC-A, and her team will be available to clean and check hearing aids, replace batteries, and make referrals to the Topeka ENT Clinic located at 920 Lane Street in Topeka.

The second Friday of each month from 2:00 pm—4:00 pm, Justin Blumreich, APRN, and staff from Rick's Advanced Dermatology and Radiance Medical Spa, will have a Wellness Skin Clinic in the Outpatient Therapy Clinic on Main Street. The first date for the Skin Clinic will be May 13. Justin will perform skin screens for cancer and make referrals for more extensive skin needs to the office, which is located at 28th and Fairlawn Road.

Topeka Ear, Nose and Throat and Rick's Dermatology and Radiance Day Spa are conveniently located on the Brewster Place Tuesday/Thursday shuttle route. For appointments to either clinic on Main Street at Brewster Place, please call Maxine in the Main Office at 274-3374. The Wellness Clinics are for all Brewster Place Residents, BrewsterConnect, and Live Well at Home by Brewster members. We look forward to seeing you there! ■

### **Love One Another**

"A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another.
By this all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (NKJV)
John 13:34-35

It sounds so easy. We believers ought to be able to love, right? It's a defining mark of who we are. It is fundamental to the faith we proclaim and commanded by the One we follow. So why is it so hard to practice this radical and inclusive love by which Jesus says people will recognize us as his followers? Let us use the letters of the word "love" to describe how to learn, cultivate, and practice this radical love.

<u>Listen</u> — to love is also to listen. It is important to listen intently to the one or ones we are called to love, to hear what he or she has to say, to be attentive to the other's feelings and thoughts. Listening involves silencing one's own internal voices by avoiding the rush to call up a response before the person has even finished speaking.

Open — to love is to be open to others and to new possibilities. The minute we close our minds and hearts to the possibility of change and growth we also smother our capacity to love. Because love is not static, because love seeks the good of others, radical love calls us to open our minds, our hearts, and our lives to the new, the strange, and even the uncomfortable.

<u>V</u>isible — to love is to be visible. Love does not hide its light. Love goes out into the world and risks being seen with those who are easy to love and those who push us beyond our comfort zones. Love does not hesitate to enter life's trenches, roll up your sleeves, and be Christ's hands, feet, and eyes in the world.

<u>Engage</u> — to love is not to sit idly and watch life go by. To love is to engage life fully, to enter into relationship with others in a spirit of hope and joy and love. Engaging in life and relationship can be messy and dirty, to be sure, but there is no other way to experience life in community and to share the love of Jesus.

Jesus commands us to "love one another." This is not an option. This is the life, the way, of those who follow Christ. ■

The slide that Carl Schmidt selected depicted my grandmother's childhood home near Ransäter, Sweden, where Amanda Carlsson resided until July 4, 1887. At age 19 and traveling alone, she boarded the steamship *De Lovisa* and sailed for the New World. I stayed in the nearby town of Munkfors, Sweden with relatives for most of my two week vacation before traveling to Ingaro, Sweden to stay my last few days in Sweden with other relatives.

The painting of Amanda's home stayed in my possession until March 8, 2016. It is now a part of the permanent collection at the Birger Sandzen Memorial Gallery in Lindsborg, Kansas.

Birger Sandzen and Carl Schmidt both attended the Art Institute of Chicago, but there is no documentation showing that they were there at the same time or met each other. However, Schmidt participated in the 1915 Panama Pacific Exposition in San Francisco, just as Sandzen did. Part of the charm of this story is how Jack lovingly and painstakingly researched possible galleries that might be interested in his much-treasured painting. After much time and consideration researching galleries across the country, Jack reached out to the Sandzen Gallery in Lindsborg, Kansas and they accepted his donation. As Jack said, "It was meant to be for this painting to find a permanent home in Lindsborg."

Around Brewster Place Jack is known as a quiet, unassuming man who has become a wonderful artist in his own right. Jack's work is on display in the Trueblood Resident Art Gallery and he has sold many of his pieces as well. And for those who didn't know, Jack is also a wonderful writer. Thank you, Jack, for sharing your story and "blazing your own trail" at Brewster Place and beyond!
