Studies show that one third of people 65-75 years of age have mild to moderate hearing loss, and for those over 75 years of age, fifty percent are affected.

There are three types of hearing loss: conductive, sensorineural and mixed hearing loss. Conductive occurs when sound is not conducted easily through the outer ear canal to the eardrum and the ossicles, or tiny bones of the middle ear. This type of hearing loss is the inability to hear faint sounds and people may ask you to "speak up." Possible causes of conductive hearing loss include: infections, poor eustachian tube function, impacted earwax, absence or malformation of the outer ear, canal or middle ear.

Sensorineural hearing loss occurs when there is damage to the inner ear or cochlea, or to the nerve

pathways from the inner ear to the brain. This type of loss makes it difficult to hear faint sounds and even when speech is amplified, is unclear or muffled. Common causes of this type of hearing loss include drugs that are toxic to ear structures, genetics, aging, head trauma and exposure to loud sounds over the years. Sensorineural is the most common type of permanent hearing loss.

Mixed hearing loss is a combination of conductive and sensorineural hearing loss. This type of hearing loss is exactly what the term implies, damage to the outer or middle ear and the cochlea and auditory nerve.

Our hearing is precious and regular examinations by our physicians are crucial for good hearing. Often referrals are made to an Ear, Nose and Throat specialist to determine what is causing the hearing loss. After a determination as to the cause of the hearing loss is made, surgery or hearing aids may be part of the treatment plan.

For the October Wellness Wednesday, we will welcome Topeka ENT audiology team to speak to us about hearing and also show us the newest technology in hearing aids. We look forward to seeing everyone there!

Flu Shot Clinics

B rewster Place will have Flu Shot Clinics in October. A complete schedule will be posted soon. We urge all staff and residents to get the flu shot.

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) the single best way to prevent the flu is to get a flu vaccine each year — especially for people 65 years of age and older and people with compromised health conditions. (cdc.gov)

Preventing the Flu: Good Health Habits

- Get your flu shot
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick
- Stay home when you are sick
- Cover your mouth and nose when coughing and sneezing
- Wash your hands often
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth
- Get plenty of sleep, by physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids and eat nutritious foods

SARA Device Donation Update

In last month's newsletter, information was shared about an anony-L mous donor who wanted to connect their donation to the number of people wearing their SARA (Situational Awareness Response Assistant) device. The donor feels strongly that it is important for *all* residents to wear their monitoring device, as it can be vital for your health and safety in times of an emergency.

Recently at different events, we have been asking the question, "Are you wearing your SARA Device?" Our generous donor pledged to the Benevolent Care Fund, an amount based on the number of residents wearing their device. If 100% of residents are wearing their monitoring device the Brewster Foundation will receive \$5 per person. If 75% are wearing their device the Foundation will receive \$3 per person, and if at least 50% are wearing their device, the Brewster Foundation will receive \$2 per person.

Our results in August were good, but not great. Our goal for September was to reach the 100% mark. We didn't make it! There were five events where counts were taken:

- 1. Wellness Wednesday (August 6) 18/21 = 86%
- 2. Coffee with David (CSP) (August 13) 32/42 = 76%
- 3. Coffee with David (BE) (August 20) 18/25 = 72%
- 4. The Forum (August 28) 13/20 = 65%
- 5. Resident Council Meeting (September 11) 76/83 = 92%

To date, over \$450 has been earned by this program. The donor has allowed the Foundation to continue this program into September and October for several select events. The first additional event was the September 17 Coffee with David where we had 19/24 (79%) wearing their SARA device. We have yet to reach 100% at an event. With your help, we hope to do so in October.

We thank our donor for his/her effort to encourage Brewster Place residents to think about safety and wellness by wearing their SARA Device. Brewster Place Foundation would like to continue to promote the importance of wearing your emergency monitoring device at all times, so that help can be summoned quickly if needed.

The Edith Lessenden Chandler Recital Series Presents International Artist Jeongwon Ham, South Korea





