

WATER — the KEY to BETTER HEALTH

We are already in the heat of summer and even though you've heard it many times before, we are going to remind you again to stay hydrated by drinking lots of water.

According to the Cleveland Clinic, "older adults are at a greater risk for dehydration because of how body composition changes with age. Those in the 65-and-older crowd simply have less water in their bodies than younger adults or children. Decreased kidney function also can affect fluid levels."

In addition, the reduction in thirst that comes with age can keep that already low supply from being replenished. "By the time an older adult feels thirsty, that's already an indication of early dehydration," says Anne Vanderbilt, CNS, of the Center for Geriatric Medicine at Cleveland Clinic.

Water is necessary for nearly every bodily function, from lubricating joints to regulating body temperature and pumping blood to your muscles. Not getting enough of it can have serious health consequences. That's why dehydration is a common cause of hospitalization among those 65 and over. In fact, last summer at Brewster Place, many of our residents who went to the emergency room or had a fall were experiencing dehydration.

According to Vanderbilt, "symptoms of dehydration in older adults often go unrecognized. Symptoms can be easily attributed to other medical conditions, medications or natural effects of aging."

Quality of Life Specialist Alyssa Granado wants to help curb dehydration at Brewster Place by having a Hydration Campaign. She will have tables set up on Thursday, July 18 from 10:00 am—12:00 pm at the Brewster Events Center and from 1:00—3:00 pm near the Redwood Information Center. Water bottles, flavor packets and electrolytes will be available as well as information about staying hydrated.


BREWSTER SOUTH EXPANSION AND THE END OF AN ERA

THE BREWSTER PLACE STORY PART 7 | BY JANIS SWANSON, EDITOR

This article was compiled using **The Brewster Place Story: A Dream Come True** which was published in 1981.

n the June issue of the Brewster News we covered the expansion of Brewster Place with the new Brewster West apartments

and cottages which opened in September 1972. Incredibly, one year later all the living units of Brewster West (12 cottages—Aspen and 26 apartments—North and South Terrace) were occupied. And there was a waiting list of 25 prospective residents.



The building project was delayed because of adverse weather as well as a fire that almost destroyed one of the cottages near

> completion. But, by the end of 1978, three of the first cottages in Brewster South were occupied.

> Executive Director Nathan Barr said, "Brewster South will represent all that we on the board and staff have learned during Brewster

Brewster West was developed as its own non-profit corporation, Brewster West Apartments, Inc., so as not to affect the original obligation and Ioan The Congregational Home held with the Kentucky Teachers' System under supervision of FHA. Brewster West had its own board of directors but operated in the same way as Brewster Place. Staff was shared between the two corporations.

By 1976 it was apparent that more living units for retired people — and especially couples — was needed. Vacant land to the south of Brewster Place had already been purchased and by January 1977, the board of directors authorized Executive Director Nathan Barr to instruct Ekdahl, Davis and Depew Architects to proceed with plans for 38 units which would be called Brewster South. This included eight cottages (Birchwood) and 30 two-bedroom, twobathroom apartments in three buildings (Oak, Maple, Cedar).

A loan was secured with Shawnee Federal Savings and Loan and Reece Shirley Construction Company was awarded the contract with their low bid of \$1,840,280. Place's 13-year existence. We have tried to incorporate features elderly people have told us they want in retirement facilities."

The Brewster South homes were the largest built at the complex and included cottages with fireplaces, secluded patios and washer-dryer set up in a separate room. Apartments included a private patio, large hobby or storage areas in the basement and a lounge for group activities.

The importance of the many solid, steadfast leaders — both volunteer and staff — in those early years cannot be overstated. The serendipitous choice of Nathan Barr to be the first Executive Director of Brewster Place was key to the success and expansion of this community. Mr. Barr announced in November 1977 that he would retire at the end of the year 1978.

"Regretfully, the Board accepted the resignation of the man who had watched Brewster Place grow from a dream-wish into a multimillion dollar institution with an enviable reputation that continued to attract more applicants than could be accommodated."

Another installment next month will feature happenings in the 1980s. ■
