When residents are asked why they chose to move to Brewster Place, the answers generally include the varied activities, amenities and opportunities that are provided as well as the wide range of services offered.

As a **Life Plan Community**, Brewster Place provides a continuum of care and services including independent living, catered living, assisted living, in-patient and out-patient rehabilitation, skilled care, and dementia care. No matter at what point a resident enters the continuum, there are services and opportunities at each level of care, and many times residents go back and forth between levels as their health situation changes. Our goal has always been and continues to be to support you in staying as independent as possible for as long as possible along the journey.

Many people not familiar with Brewster Place don't realize the majority of living spaces at Brewster Place are in independent living. On our beautiful, 30+ acre campus, the variety of apartments, cottages, town homes and villas make Brewster Place unique. We recognize, "one space or budget, does not fit all." The same holds true for the continuum of care, as every resident will experience unique challenges requiring the support of staff from different specialized areas.

To help familiarize you on the services and support available to you, Director of Therapy Brooke Kelly schedules **Community Wide Resource Meetings** twice a year so you can meet and visit with staff from departments such as therapy, social services, and health services. These meetings are a great time to gather information and ask questions so if you are ever in need of extra services, you know what to expect. Staff will provide information to support residents through an event in their life that would lead to the need of a Rehab stay, Meadowlark Home Health services and/or caregiver supports. Caregiver support groups and AA meetings on campus are also discussed.

Meetings are planned for different areas of campus, but please attend a meeting that best fits your schedule. If you have any questions about the meetings, please contact Brooke at 785-274-3338. ■

he new millennium at Brewster Place began with the Grand Opening on Januarv 14. 2000 of the Winchell Wellness Center and the Commerce Bank and Trust Brewster Place Branch. The Winchell Wellness Center, named after resident Bernita

Winchell, was made possible by her contributions. Commerce Court (which is the current Winchell Wellness Center) was made possible by a significant contribution of Commerce Bank and Trust and included the full service bank branch. a convenience store,

health clinic and beauty shop. The renovation of the chapel was also completed in January. In May of the same year, the Resource Center opened which provided opportunities for residents to learn about computers and use them at their leisure. In addition, Brewster's first CCTV channel, BPTV 5, began operation.

In the next few years, renovations began in the Main Building including new heating and air conditioning, hallway redecoration, new door handles and locks and new laundry facilities. Outdoor grounds improvements also continued and work began on a new west entryway for the Main Building in late 2001. In addition, all buildings in Brewster South and Brewster East were painted and work began in the fall of 2001 on renovation and redecorating of Brewster East. In addition, Brewster Health Center expanded therapy services to residents on an outpatient basis.


The beginning of 2002 saw the explanation of plans for construction of eight new town homes (now Grand Homes) as well as a Health Center reconfiguration process that would better serve residents

> with Alzheimer's and other dementias. This project was completed in 2003.

This same vear is when Brewster Place adopted a tobacco free environment where use of tobacco was prohibited anywhere on campus. In early August of 2003, the town

home project was completed with most of them already spoken for. In addition, the lower level of Main Building was set for a major renovation which included a recreation room, library and storage space as well as the updating the long hallway connecting Commerce Court to the recreation area. This area was made possible by a large bequest from Norbert Klinge, a longtime resident of Brewster Place. This space was named after him and is still known as the Klinge Activity Center.

The 2005 Capital Improvement budget was \$1.2 million which allowed for changes in the Main Lounge and dining room. Completion of this project added the Founders Room meeting area and enclosing part of front porch to expand the dining room. Less noticeable but also important, was the installation of a new sprinkler system. Another important change occurred

In December 2005, Mary Beth Saylor was named Director of the Foundation with Director of Development and Community Relations Tom Akins being named President of the Foundation.

In 2007 Brewster Place became a Pioneer Partner of the KU Osher Lifelong Learning Series — a series that continues today. The Brewster Foundation received the largest donation ever with more than \$735,000 left to Brewster Place by the estate of longtime resident Betty Bass.

The Brewster Health Center was one of only three homes for seniors in Kansas to be honored by the PEAK Award (Promote Excellent Alternatives in Kansas Nursing Homes). Brewster Health Center has won this award multiple times over the subsequent years.

January 2008 began with the use of a new logo which replaced the tree logo. The blue, green and orange colors of the new logo were recognition that Brewster Place was growing on campus but also by providing various services to retirees in the wider community.

Brewster at Home was introduced in November 2008 and aimed at providing, "services people need, when they need them, in the place they call home." Another huge accomplishment in 2008 was the long sought-after purchase of the Country Club Apartments that sat in the center of our campus.

The end of the decade was filled with another major renovation project. The first floor of Brewster East was set to undergo a total renovation that would result in a more up-to-date and functional space. ■

ort Riley is a premier training site, with 150 square miles of dedicated training ar-

ea, equipped with cutting edge, state-of-the-art training aids to build and maintain combat ready forces. The installation is home to the oldest continuously serving active-duty division in the U.S. Army, 1st Infantry Division.



Located in the Flint Hills region of Kansas, Fort Riley hosts

approximately 15,000 active-duty service members and more than 18,000 family members. The area is also home to nearly 30,000 veterans, retirees and 5, 600 civilian employees who work at the post.

We are excited to visit the US Army Base at Fort Riley: Home of the 1st Infantry Division with historian Bob Smith. We will take guided tours of both the US Cavalry Museum and the 1^{st} Infantry Division Museum, with a

lunch break in-between. These Fort Riley museums serve to collect, preserve, exhibit, and interpret those materials that are integral parts of the history and traditions of the U.S. Cavalry from 1775 to 1950. In addition, the Museum Division is responsible for exhibiting and interpreting the history of Fort Riley from its establishment to the pre-

sent, to include its various schools, major commands, and community life.
