ay is Mental Health Awareness Month. Each year this month aims to bring an understanding and acceptance of mental health issues, while working to reduce the stigma associated with mental illness.

Approximately 14% of adults aged 60 and over live with mental health conditions. Older adults are at greater risk of experiencing mental health conditions such as coping with serious illnesses or losing a loved one. Many older adults will adjust to these life changes, but some may experience continued feelings of grief, social isolation or loneliness. Often, these individuals do not seek the care they need for mental health conditions because they believe their symptoms (listed to the right) are a normal part of aging and often feel a negative stigma or shame associated with mental health conditions.

Mental health conditions can be treated and starting a conversation with your primary care physician is a good place to start. It can often be difficult to determine if you are struggling with a mental health condition or normal symptoms of aging.

As a good reminder for all, mental health does matter. It is okay to not be okay. You are enough. The world is a better place with you in it. Keep going and don't be so hard on yourself. Continue to work toward ending the stigma.

Symptoms of mental health conditions in older adults include:

- Feeling sad, empty or hopeless often or all the time
- Not wanting to engage in activities that used to be fun
- Weight gain or loss, or changes in appetite
- Trouble falling asleep or staying asleep, or sleeping too much
- Feeling irritable, easily frustrated or restless
- Lack of energy or feeling tired
- Feeling worthless or overly guilty
- Trouble concentrating, remembering things, or making decisions
- Thinking about suicide or harming yourself

he Brewster Place Accounting Team would like to use National Accounting Day on May 19 to invite those who are not currently signed up for Automatic Withdrawal to do so!

Automatic withdrawal allows you to have your monthly statement amount automatically deducted from your bank account. Those who participate will still get a copy of their monthly statement so they know what amount will be withdrawn.

In addition, you would still be able to contact accounting regarding questions or concerns on your statement **before** it would be withdrawn from your account, **and** you would not have to remember to write physical checks anymore.

The deduction from your account would occur between the 15th-17th of each month (depending how the weekends/holidays fall). If you are not currently signed up and would like to sign up or get more information, please call the **Accounting Hotline at 785-274-5570** and leave a voicemail and we will get back to you as soon as possible!

Before John Glenn orbited the earth or Neil Armstrong walked on the moon, a group of dedicated female mathematicians known as 'human computers' used pencils, slide rules and adding machines to calculate the numbers that would launch rockets, and astronauts, into space. Among these problem-solvers were a group of exceptionally talented African American women, some of the brightest minds of their generation.

Originally relegated to teaching math in the South's segregated public schools, they were called into service during the labor shortages of World War II, when America's aeronautics industry was in dire need of anyone who had the right stuff. Suddenly, these overlooked math whizzes had a shot at jobs worthy of their skills, and they answered Uncle Sam's call, moving to Hampton, Virginia, and the fascinating, high-energy world of the Langley Memorial Aeronautical Laboratory. Even as Virginia's Jim Crow laws required them to be segregated from their white counterparts, the women of Langley's all-black 'West Computing' group helped America achieve one of the things it desired most: a decisive victory over the Soviet Union in the Cold War, and complete domination of the heavens. -Publisher's description
