In fact, many times residents move back and forth across the continuum as their health situation changes.

The majority of living spaces at Brewster Place are independent living ranging from large homes with finished basements and two-car garages to one-bedroom and studio apartments. Brewster Place is unique because of the variety of living spaces we offer, but also because of the amenities, services and programs available on a daily basis.

One of the most important reasons for moving to a Life Plan Community like Brewster Place is the peace of mind that comes from giving up the stressors of home maintenance while being able to focus on doing what you enjoy most. Equally important, is the knowledge that specialized support is available from professional and skilled staff you see everyday on campus.

YOUR RESIDENT COUNCIL AT WORK

SPIRITUAL LIFE COMMITTEE | FOOD PANTRY

The Spiritual Life Committee is sponsoring a food pantry at Brewster Place. Residents can make donations at two locations:

- **The Evergreens** - on the ground floor near the west elevator
- **Redwood** - on the lower level near the outside The Market near the Pavilion

Beneficiaries of the Food Pantry are Brewster Place staff. They may receive items in designated staff break areas.

Items to be donated include non-perishable foods and personal care items. All must be in new, unopened packaging.

Support of this valuable program allows residents who have plenty the opportunity to share items to support staff members and their families who need assistance.

Suggested Items Include:

- Canned goods such as canned beans and vegetables, canned chicken or tuna, canned soups and pasta meals.
- Grains and pasta such as rice, pasta and pasta sauce, instant oatmeal or cereal.
- Fruits and vegetables such as canned fruits, canned vegetables, applesauce.
- Snacks and breakfast items such as granola bars or protein bars, peanut butter or other nut butters, pancake and muffin mixes that require addition of water only.
- Personal care items including toiletries such as deodorant, soap, shampoo, toothpaste; diapers (variety of sizes) and baby wipes, feminine hygiene products. ■

KU OSHER LIFELONG LEARNING INSTITUTE

The American Revolution: The British Perspective, 1775-1783

Instructor: Bob Smith

Thursdays, March 19, 26 and April 2

1:00—3:00 pm | Cultural Arts Center

Join us for an exercise in perspective: We're studying the American Revolution from the British point of view! We'll start with why the British Crown went to war, their public's perception of the conflict and the dissenting voices within British. Next, we'll examine both the British political and the military's strategic vision in conducting the war and the logistical handicaps they faced. Finally, we'll look at the successes and failures of the British military operations during the conflict and the motivates for ending the conflict.

Cartoons: From Disney to Saturday Morning to Pixar and Beyond

Instructor: Karl Menninger

Tuesdays, April 14, 21 and 28

We started watching cartoons as children, either at the movies or on television on Saturday mornings. Many of us continue to watch them, even without children or grandchildren. We'll look at the invention of the animated cartoon in the Silent Era, the creation of a certain Mouse by a guy from Kansas City and the entertainment empire that spawned. Next, we'll study cartoons from other studios (Betty Boop, Popeye, Bugs Bunny, Daffy Duck, Tom and Jerry, Mr. Magoo, Mighty Mouse), how cartoons went to war in the 1940s and how they migrated to television, both on Saturday mornings and on "kiddie" shows on weekday afternoons. Finally, we'll review the Disney renaissance in the 1990s, with "The Little Mermaid" and "The Lion King," long-running prime-time cartoons such as "the Simpsons," recent Disney competitors (Don Bluth, Ralph Bakshi, DreamWorks), and Pixar, who led the way in computer-generated animation with "Toy Story" and "Frozen." We'll also share where we watched cartoons: the movies, television, VHS/DVD/Blu-Ray and now streaming services like Disney+.

The Development & Evolution of the United States Army: The Cold War Years 1947-1995

(This class continues the course taught in 2025)

Instructor: Bob Smith

Thursdays, May 14, 21 and 28

1:00—3:00 pm | Cultural Arts Center

This class picks up where "The Growth and Evolution of the United States Army, 1775 – 1945" left off. Over three weeks we'll examine the changes of the U.S. Army during the Cold War years that focused on a doctrine of containing and limiting Community expansion. In the first class, we'll look at the Korean War and the planned deterrence of the Soviet-led Warsaw Pact forces in Eastern Europe. Next, we'll focus on the Army's plans for continental defense in the nuclear/mis-sile age and the restructuring of the Army's tactical organization from the 1950s Pentomic Division to the ROAD Division of the early 1960s. Lastly, we'll delve into the Army's operations during the Vietnam Conflict, its rebuilding and reequipping in the 1970s and its land, sea and air doctrine of the Desert Storm era.
